Farnham Street Neighbourhood Learning Centre (FSNLC) has been providing adult community education and social support programs to the local community for 40 years, including Language, Literacy & Numeracy, Computer & Digital Skills Training, Mindworks Art Program, Life Skills Cooking, Mental Health Support Group, Community Garden, Older Women's Social Group, Community Choir and Gentle Exercise for Older Adults.

Farnham Street runs programs in partnership with Avondale Heights, Niddrie, Flemington and Moonee Ponds Libraries, as well as hosting the Helping Hand Refugee Youth Mentoring Program and an Elderly Chinese Group in North Melbourne. Farnham Street is also a model of environmental sustainability with a Community Garden, Compost Bins, Water Tanks, a Fruit Forest and Solar Panels.

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CENTRE MANAGER'S REPORT

Once again we had a difficult and uncertain year, with COVID ensuring there were many restrictions and lockdowns, some being called at a moment's notice. There was an enormous amount of pivoting and flexing to online classes and sending out of education workbooks, however, the experience of 2020 put us in a better position to cope with the constant changes. There was much time spent on the installation of QR codes and sign-in sheets, COVID roadmaps and Vaccination information sessions. More recently, many staff members have been helping participants to align their Vaccination Certificates with their MyGov accounts.

Term One commenced with a reduced Education program, due to the decision not to run Accredited Training this year.

Our Pre-accredited classes were very well-attended but again interrupted by COVID, leading to the closure of Farnham Street and the Moonee Valley Libraries (see Education Report).

We started working in partnership with
Assembled Threads, a Social Enterprise
based in Moonee Ponds. Assembled Threads
provides opportunities for local CALD
women to work as seamstresses. We provide
volunteers to support the women in the

development of their English Language and Literacy skills as well as applying for and auspicing funding on their behalf. They were successful in receiving a Grant from the Melbourne Airport Community Fund, among others, to expand their Manufacturing Hub in the North West of Melbourne.

Term Two started well with the Launch of our Communities Environment Project on Sunday April 18th by our local Federal MP, Bill Shorten. This was a Commonwealth Government funded Project and we had lots of assistance from Bill's office. The event was very successful with many people attending the workshops. Many thanks go to the Coordinator, Pat Long, who did such an amazing job in managing all aspects of the Project.

We celebrated Neighbourhood House Week, Volunteer Week and the end of Ramadan by holding an Eid Morning Tea on Friday 7th May. Once again our wonderful State MP and Assistant Treasurer, Minister for Creative Industries and Acting Police Minister, Danny Pearson, was the Special Guest. He spoke of the significant contribution Neighbourhood Houses and Volunteers make to their local communities. Nofa Nizam, our Administrative Officer, spoke about the importance of Ramadan to the Muslim

community.

Also on May 7th we had a farewell afternoon tea for our fabulous Choir Leader and Mindworks Coordinator, Ruth Kennedy, who was here for seven years. Ruth is an exceptionally talented and inspiring person who will be greatly missed. We wish her all the best in her new job in Coffs Harbour.

Many activities were either postponed or cancelled when we went into lockdown again in Term Two (see CD Report). However, we were able to run the Power Savings Bonus Workshop which gave our Concession Card holders \$250 towards their power bills this winter. It was a State Government Initiative and many people attended the session.

Again in Term Three we went into another lockdown, which has just recently been lifted. The Centre was closed for all classes as well as the regular hirers and weekend party groups. All students and Centre participants were contacted on a regular basis as per our Social Contact plan. Some came to the park next door every day at 2pm for the Coffee Club. We were very



fortunate to have Bill, Chloe and Clementine Shorten met up with the group and listen to their experiences over COVID.

In Term Four we became an official Carer Friendly House, through a course run by Neighbourhood Houses Victoria. There are many carers and Carers Groups involved at Farnham Street, and they support they offer to the people they care for is extraordinary. We will be providing more services next year through our Carers Support Grant.

The Mental Health Support Group, the Boomerang Network, kept in contact with all their members during the lockdowns and recently started back with drop in sessions, weekly dinners and weekend outings. Due to the tireless work of their President, Shane Evans, and Secretary, Nancy Chau, the group continues to flourish and makes a huge difference to people with a lived experience of mental illness. The Group received a Health Conditions Grant and a Bi-annual Grant from Moonee Valley council.

I continued my involvement with the
Flemington Consultative Committee, a
group set up by Danny Pearson MP to
advise on key areas of the Flemington Public
Housing Estate Redevelopment. The Project
is well underway and will make an enormous
difference to the Estate residents, and the
Flemington community in general.

We were successful in receiving a Victorian Government Business Support Grant due to the lockdown, which helped enormously with the Centre finances. Our book-keeper, Adriana Nelli and Frank Dinoto from Danny Pearson's office were instrumental in obtaining the Grant.

Currently we provide auspices for seven regular groups: The Chinese Elderly Group, The Helping Hand Refugee Youth Mentoring Project, the Boomerang Network, Assembled Threads, the Vietnamese Line Dancing Group, the Elderly Eritrean Women's Group and the Eritrean Young Mother's Group. When the Moonee Valley Council's Community Grants Program is open there can be more requests from smaller groups who need auspicing, as they are not incorporated and don't have their own Insurance.

We were again supported by our **recurrent funding bodies:**

- City of Moonee Valley, which owns and maintains our beautiful venue at 28
 Farnham Street. This funding also enables us to run programs at Farnham Street

as well as at the Moonee Valley Libraries (Flemington, Moonee Ponds, Niddrie and Avondale Heights).

EDUCATION REPORT

Despite 2021 being another COVIDdominated year, Farnham Street Neighbourhood Learning Centre (FSNLC) has gallantly continued to run preaccredited courses (funded through Adult, Community and Further Education (ACFE), and we thank them for their continued support.

This year, we delivered levels 1-4 English Language, Literacy and Numeracy courses, four Literacy for Further Learning/Cooking classes, nine Computer classes, four English Conversation classes, two Fluency in Reading/Reading Matters classes, a Mindworks Art class, a Mindworks/ Boomerang Network session and a Children's Book Publishing course. We also delivered Pathways and Volunteer Pathways Training and Skills, Cesar Melhem, in programs.

This year we ran two new Skills for Work and Study pilot programs - in Aged Care and Community Services. These courses are specifically aimed at students who need to improve their literacy and numeracy skills before embarking on further or Accredited training in these areas. While the programs are an excellent concept, recruiting students proved extremely difficult. Nonetheless, through much targeted marketing and dogged recruitment we managed to fulfil

our targets and successfully deliver both courses (the Community Services course will finish at the end of the year). Farnham Street was one of only a few Learn Locals to be able to fulfil their commitment to this program in 2021 and we are proud of this achievement.

To cap off what has been a very successful year in many ways for Farnham Street, one of our students, whom we nominated for the Victorian Learn Local Awards - Mariam Yacoub Ibrahim - has been named as a finalist in the Victorian Learn Local pre-accredited Learner (Skills for Work) Category. Her nomination was acknowledged during a visit to Farnham Street by Parliamentary Secretary for November. The winner will be announced at a Gala Awards ceremony on 10 December.

PRE-ACCREDITED COURSES

In 2021, Farnham Street ceased to offer Accredited courses. This was a decision taken to better meet the needs of our cohort and, almost a year on, the observable benefits have been huge.

The flexibility afforded by Pre-Accredited programs means that our students can more easily combine work and/or caring

for family with their studies. The programs themselves are much better contextualised to the needs and interests of the students, without the burden of onerous continual assessments.

All teachers have reported that they much prefer teaching these Pre-Accredited programs and that they are working better for their students (i.e. are more 'fit-forpurpose') than Accredited classes.

Once again, with Victoria in and out of COVID lockdowns throughout the year, the Centre was able to pivot from face-to-face to online learning, and back again, fairly seamlessly.

We are very pleased with the way we managed to retain most of our students in what has been another extremely challenging year.

ADAPTATION TO TEACHING AND LEARNING DURING COVID LOCK-DOWN IN 2021

In anticipation of the possibility of further lockdowns in 2021, student workbooks were collated and ready to distribute when the lockdowns began. Again, FSNLC staff members were magnificent in rising to the challenge of assisting in the preparation and delivery – often by hand – of these resources.

As with last year, classes continued using a blend of suitable delivery formats. This blend included teachers connecting with each student across their regular timetables using, in conjunction with their workbooks WhatsApp, FaceTime, Phone calls and Zoom.

Our wonderful volunteers again provided much-needed extra support and one-on-one focus (albeit remotely) and their valuable role in the organisation was highlighted anew. Special thanks must be extended to our Volunteer Coordinator, Robbie Cottrill who, retiring at the end of this year, leaves behind her a thriving and vital volunteer/mentor network that she has nurtured over the years.

Anecdotal feedback has been largely positive but understandably tempered by a second year of wearisome interruptions to learning. Again, people's experiences

of blended learning varied dramatically depending on their personal circumstances, including access to internet, data, devices, home schooling obligations, etc.

One particular – and crucially important – achievement has been the role FSNLC has served in educating, assuring and encouraging people during the COVID 19 vaccination rollout. From many of students initially showing real resistance to vaccination, we are proud to say that we have around 98% of our student population now fully vaccinated.

In her role providing 'Form Help' and other essential administrative assistance to our community, Nofa Nizam has helped numerous students to download their digital vaccination certificate and link up with the Services Victoria App.

FARNHAM STREET CLASSES IN 2021

Again, our Cooking students were the most affected by the challenges associated with the COVID lockdown. Our dedicated teachers, Kathy Bocquet and Donald Wake, continued to call those students who wanted to be contacted to maintain a regular connection. In the window between lockdowns the groups connected within social distancing restrictions and managed to complete some of their teaching and learning activities.

As restrictions ease toward the end of 2021, they've once again been returning to meet in COVID safe formats, including meeting in the local parks. The Mindworks Art class again pivoted beautifully under the guidance of teacher, Guler Altunbas, convening on Zoom and continuing their creative endeavours.

Great demand for computer classes during COVID saw our Computer teachers, Chiemi Jardine and Manrico Moro busier than ever and flexing to adapt lessons to meet changing needs of students.

The English Conversation and Reading
Matters classes resumed again on Zoom and
provided routine and stimulation during the
long months of lockdowns.

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COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Once again, due to Covid-19 restrictions, this year has been a mish mash for our community development programs. We started the year well, but had mini lockdowns, and then the latest big one.

VOLUNTEERING

During most of the first semester our wonderful volunteers helped out in classes and mentored our students. A few weeks into third term, we went into lockdown and the volunteers continued to provide support through phone conversations, Zoom, or whatever platform was comfortable for them, and there were some meetings in the park next door. Volunteers were not needed to help in classes as they were held online. Students were again sent workbooks, and volunteers guided them through their homework.

There is always a turnover of volunteers, many finding work, or deciding to volunteer elsewhere, but currently we have 21 on our books and hopefully they will return next year. There are many people in our community wanting to volunteer so once an advertisement is put up on the Seek Volunteer website, we get many responses.

Volunteers in the community garden were allowed to work on and off during the year, and are have just started to come back.

We highly value the efforts that our volunteers make with our students and FSNLC in general. Without their generosity and energy our work would be much harder.

HELP WITH FORMS

Our partnership continued with the Flemington Library in running Help with Forms, with appointments being made in the Library, but from August onwards, there was some help available by phone or Zoom, and occasionally in the park. People come for help often with very complex issues, and it can take more than one session to help them.

EXCURSIONS

We had an extremely enjoyable trip to Torquay to celebrate Cultural Diversity Week in March. Many of the staff and students had a great day at the beach. We were due to go to the Zoo in June, but this was cancelled due to a mini lockdown.

FARNHAM STREET CHOIR

Ruth Kennedy and the Choir met via Zoom in Term One this year, but unfortunately she relocated to northern NSW. She was a great asset to Farnham Street and we were very sorry to lose her. John Howard took over and the Choir did meet briefly until we had another lockdown. The Choir won't recommence until next and, as John is moving on, there will be a new Choir leader, Anne Vercoe.

OUR COMMUNITY GARDEN

Despite everything the garden is looking wonderful. It was open to everyone before August, but has been shut since then. The gardening group usually meets every Friday and have recommenced recently.

CELEBRATIONS AND EVENTS

We had morning teas for International Women's Day in March, Anzac Day in April, Neighbourhood House Week, Volunteer Wee and Eid in May and Men's Health Week in June. Many thanks go to Kathy Bouquet and Donald Wake who do a wonderful job with their students to cook food for these events.

The Refugee Week activities took place in the last week of Term Two, run by teachers in their individual classes and included Mah Jong, Water Colour painting and other games. The Jewellery Making, Self Defense and Gentle Exercise classes, the Community BBQ and trip to the Zoo were cancelled, hopefully to be rescheduled at a later date.

Adult Learner's Week was celebrated in September with an online presentation which showcased the progress of our wonderful students.

OTHER COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

- The Tuesday night Social Group (for older women living alone), run in conjunction with Kensington Neighbourhood House, had one outing this year. With all the lockdowns it was too hard to organise. It will recommence next year.
- The Gentle Exercise for Older Adults class ran for parts of the year and recently started up again.
- The Farnham Street Book Group also ran for parts of the year but will not resume until next year.

ROBBIE COTTRILL

THE CHINESE CENTRE REPORT

I started in my role as Community
Development Worker at the Chinese
Centre earlier this year and it wasn't long
before the many lockdowns started. During
these times I offered support to the elderly
Chinese residents, most of who live in the
North Melbourne High Rise Estate, checking
in with them and receiving phone calls from
them, making sure that they went out for
their regular walks and generally looking
after their well-being.

We created a chat group on Wechat where every member would post and greet each other. It was a good way to communicate and to share any information. I posted upcoming programs which kept their morale up so when lockdown was over we had something to look forward to. I was able to consult them to get ideas as to what their interests were and research places for group outings. I supported them by making phone calls to the Ministry of Housing to get general maintenance items fixed and

translated letters they received which they could not read.

Most members do not own a Smartphone and were unable to download the Covid certificates. I assisted them to access their certificates through their family doctor or get a print out from Medicare, and made sure they complied before lockdown ended.

When we weren't in lockdown I organised a number of outings and information sessions including; an outing to Bendigo to take advantage of free travel for Seniors, Chinese Buffet Lunches, an upcoming day trip to the Dandenongs, an information session with Lucy Li, a COVID nurse, the Moving for Life program at the Ascot Vale Leisure Centre, designed to strengthen and increase flexibility for older adults, and a "Money talks for Better Ageing" financial counselling session.

I am really enjoying the position and hoping for a relatively COVID free 2022.

THE HELPING HAND PROJECT

MENTORING PROGRAM

The Project employs a Program
Coordinator, Gabrielle Orosz, for
48 hours per month. The Project
is also supported by Conrad Aikin,
Senior Practitioner Counsellor and
Advocate who provides regular
guidance and professional training
and advice to the volunteer mentors
at monthly meetings. He also
provides support on a needs basis
and via half day trainings sessions
on the Refugee Asylum Seeker
Experience.

MENTEE REFERRALS

The Project Coordinator is actively engaged in youth settlement program with the Centre for Multicultural Youth, and also holds a role as Project Officer for the Envision program. She regularly presents to network meetings in youth settlement and the multicultural service sector, along with schools with large cohorts of refugee families to promote the program and generate referrals throughout City of Moonee Valley, Maribyrnong, Brimbank and

Wyndham. Outreach has been conducted to approximately 14 service providers in community services, settlement services, multicultural youth services and education and TAFE providers over the past 12 months.

VOLUNTEER MENTORS

The Project Coordinator also promotes the program to prospective new volunteer mentors. During 2021, volunteer Information / Induction sessions have being conducted online, resulting in the matching of 11 new partnerships to date for 2021

After a challenging year, mentors have resumed meeting face to face focusing on support for mentees goals and aspirations including English language, education pathways, drivers' licence, enrolling in further studies, homework, social and recreational connections and navigating life in Australia.

Program - 26 active mentor / mentee partnerships are currently in progress.

Program – geographical spread. The program is currently operating in City of Moonee Valley, City of Melbourne, Brimbank and Maribyrnong and Wyndham.

Participants - The program supports young people of refugee background between the ages 15-25.



TREASURER'S REPORT

It has certainly been a challenging year, with the impact of Covid-19 on our Centre's operations, student numbers and finances. We also saw continuing decline in demand for our accredited training courses and a decision to cease operating as a Registered Training Organisation.

Our revenue was much lower than last year in both pre-accredited and accredited funding, but we were able to offset this after a restructure of operations and a reduction in staff and operational costs.

Our Auspice funding included a large grant we sponsored for the Assembled Threads group and paid through to them in June 2021.

We showed significant less revenue for other projects and expenses because The Little Things Project ended in the previous financial year.

Our employee costs are also lower, reflecting the suspension of RTO operations and some staff departures.

Despite the challenges our financial position remains strong, partly due to the COVID-19 financial assistance from the Government.

We have a healthy balance sheet and cash balances which leave us in a good position to manage our future.

This is in no small part due to the great work that continues to be done by Cathy, Adriana and the rest of the team at Farnham Street in managing our finances.
